Why learning German is a good idea

Let's start with a few facts

German is spoken by around 120 million people around the world. The native speakers mostly live in Germany (83 million – that makes it the most widely spoken language in Europe!) but you will also find them in Austria, Switzerland, Liechtenstein and Luxembourg.
